This year, our 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade students will be learning how to trust in the goodness of God's story. We'll study the Bible timeline, going through many stories of those who trusted God's story and those who did not. We'll put timeline cards in order. We'll play games and do challenges to introduce different stories. We'll talk about how the Bible is one huge story composed of many little stories. We want to encourage you to study with us at home! Read through each story as we discuss it, talk about whether or not the people in the story trusted God's story, and talk about how it fits in with the rest of God's story.
